



86% of respondents said that they believe the government should require drug companies to provide advance notice of price increases and information to justify those increases, including 86% of Republican respondents, 87% of Democrat respondents, and 86% of unaffiliated respondents.

92% of respondents agreed that the government should expand health insurance options so that everyone can afford quality coverage, including 89% of Republican respondents, 94% of Democrat respondents, and 93% of unaffiliated respondents.

91% of respondents said that they believe the government should make it easy to switch insurers if a health plan drops your doctor, including 92% of Republican respondents, 91% of Democrat respondents, and 90% of unaffiliated respondents.

87% of respondents said that they believe the government should set standard prices for prescription drugs to make them affordable, including 85% of Republican respondents, 90% of Democrat respondents, and 87% of unaffiliated respondents.

89% of respondents said that they believe the government should show what a fair price would be for specific procedures, including 90% of Republican respondents, 89% of Democrat respondents, and 89% of unaffiliated respondents.
